Patrick R. Stewart is the founding principal of *Patrick R. Stewart Architect (PRSA)*, a full-service architectural firm, with a First Nations community development focus. Patrick was the first architect of First Nations ancestry in B.C. to own and operate an architectural firm in B.C.

He is a citizen of the Nisga'a Nation in northwestern B.C. from the community of Gingolx, a member of the Killerwhale House of Daxaan.

Patrick has twenty-five years of architectural related experience and has twelve years as principal of his own firm, previously known as *Sagalts'apkw Architecture*. He was the first Aboriginal President of the Architectural Institute of British Columbia (2005-2007). Patrick is the Chair of the Aboriginal Homelessness Steering Committee For Greater Vancouver.
